



The mobile app offers extensive post-shoot editing options, as well as a camera feature that allows you to shoot raw on your iPhone (Android can do this with your own camera), giving you more options for exposure correction, white balance, and more. your pictures. You can even shoot with activated filters, such as black and white filters. The October 2022 update added content-based object removal, automatic selection of people and objects, and adaptive portrait and sky presets. The latest July update included basic video editing and effects. Free users get a decent selection of editing tools and even filters - now with an amount slider to increase or decrease effects. paid users get cloud photo storage and many other effects like masking, healing, and suggested presets. The app is full of help and tips for taking great photos. Lightroom Mobile even lets you submit your work to Discover's community of photographers who can try to edit your image. You can subscribe to mobile apps for just \$4.99 per month with just 100GB of cloud storage to sync with. Adobe Lightroom Mobile (for iPhone). it's a simplified version of the company's flagship Photoshop app. Like Lightroom Mobile, Photoshop Express is free, but its paid plan is cheaper than Lightroom at \$2.99 per month or \$34.99 per year. Like its desktop counterparts, Photoshop Express is typically used for collages, smudge removal, text overlays, masks, and compositing rather than photo editing and enhancement. However, you get all these tools in the app, and like Lightroom Mobile and Snapseed, Photoshop Express supports camera raw files. The latest update added skin smoothing, content-based healing, face thinning, and a cartoon filter to round out the app's rich selection of effect filters.
